Cascade to increase flights, expand routes

In addition to the pilots and augmented Cascade personnel at the Walla Walla City-County Airport. where the airline will maintain seven of its planes. Walla Wallans will also have access to added round-trip

flights to Portland and Spokane. Cascade has also proposed new service between Lewiston and Boise,

which would take effect Aug. 1, if approved by Idaho officials. That would give the Blue Mountain country a link to southern Idaho via

company these changes, Nilson says. In fact. Cascade hopes to complete joint-fare arrangements with other

airlines that would lower interline costs to all U.S. points.

Nilson says those plans may be completed within a month. The company also has announced some long-term hopes of converting

from a commuter airline into a fullfledged certificated carrier. Nilson says an application to the Civil Aeronautics Board is being prepared by Cascade that would

grant the airline limited certification.

If approved, certification would make Cascade eligible for government-guaranteed loans to finance

purchase of new equipment.

Nilson says the CAB application will be built around a fleet of 19passenger Metro airplanes with pressurized cabins.

month from here, according to Nilson. Now the airline sells between 1,200

and 1,400 tickets for Walla Walla flights each month. Nilson estimates that figure could rise as high as 1,800 under the new schedule, with 16 incoming and 16

outgoing flights a day except Saturday. Walla Walla flights to Seattle that

the past will stop over in the Tri-Cities

or Yakima beginning June 1. That should increase seat availability for Walla Wallans, since ticket competition from Pullmar customers sometimes crowded out local would-be passengers. Nilson
